"A View from the Bridge"

Experience is the best teacher! And "wake-up" calls can be alarming.

I have raced on sailing crews for over twenty years and all but one crew practiced man overboard drills; that crew was for an ocean race to Bermuda. The crew was required to take special training, including live, man over board practice drills. All the sail racing experiences didn't even mention or discuss it.

One 'wake-up' call came to one north shore yacht club, which had a man overboard event take place at the end of a race in the local harbor. The crew member was struck unconscious by the boom and fell overboard in the dark with no PFD. Fortunately, he was quickly found and recue breathing techniques were performed while the victim was propped up on the sloped transom of the boat until local law enforcement could transport the person to the hospital— where he fully recovered.

- Consequently, our first **Man Overboard Seminar** was held at the yacht club a few weeks later and to their credit they continue to conduct **Man Overboard Practice**
- 4 Sessions at the beginning of each season, now.
- 4 Another north shore yacht club recently experienced a man over board event, as well.
- Thankfully, not as drastic as the previous event mentioned. But this personal scare was enough to make the club realize preparation is key and we were invited to hold a
- 6 Man Overboard Seminar for them, as well.
- 7 Human nature is that nothing will ever happen to me!
- Such was the case with my race crew. It is my practice to train the crew to sail the boat, manage the sails and to motor on and off the mooring. We continuously rehearse critical maneuvers to retrieve "Wilson" (remember the film *Castaway* with Tom Hanks?).
 - maneuvers to retrieve "Wilson" (remember the film *Castaway* with Tom Hanks?), a gallon jug, with a loop around its ear, which is thrown overboard. Sounds great, right!
 - However, at the end of last season, I myself, had a medical emergency and had to rely on my crew to get me to medical attention on land—quickly. Unfortunately, I never trained anyone to 'dock the boat.' The fact is 'I spent ten years on a mooring and rarely
- went to the dock myself other than, perhaps twice a year, for fuel.

Needles to say, I now assign dedicated time for boat handling practice for the crew including **how to dock**.

On-Water Mass Gatherings – Recreational, Sporting, or Cause-Related Events

On-water mass gatherings pose concerns due to the safety issues they create for the boating public and the Maritime Transportation System (MTS). Regardless of the nature of these gatherings, whether recreational, sporting or cause-related, they are primarily a boating safety issue. As these types of marine events continue to grow in popularity throughout the country, the Coast Guard will work together with its port partners to ensure the safety on the marine transportation system. These actions will take into account health and safety factors including but not limited to local COVID-19 and social distance guidelines as well as current unrest.

The Coast Guard issues permits for, and monitors marine events, to ensure safety of life at sea and on our waterways. Permits are required for powerboat races, sailing regattas, and other marine events that have the potential to draw an accumulation of spectator craft, may obstruct a waterway, or introduce extra or unusual hazards to the safety of human life on the navigable waters of the United States. A large gathering of recreational boaters would not necessarily meet the requirement for an event permit. It is recommended you contact your local Captain of the Port to determine if your event will require a permit.

The Coast Guard and our port partners are committed to ensuring the safety and security of the waterway. ...The goal of these patrols is to ensure mariners using the waterway are not negatively impacted due to the anticipated increase in vessel traffic and to ensure that commercial traffic can safely continue operations. ...The presence of the Coast Guard and its partners on the waterway is not to support the event itself, but to ensure the waterway is safe for all mariners due to the anticipated increase in traffic.

Boating accidents can occur quickly and without warning. To ensure a safe and enjoyable time on the water, the Coast Guard is asking boaters to ensure they have the necessary knowledge and safety equipment before getting underway. This includes a properly fitting life jacket for each passenger, a VHF radio, and flares. The Coast Guard regularly conducts recreational boating safety checks. Failure to have the necessary safety equipment may result in the termination of a voyage. Having the basic equipment can ensure a safe and enjoyable day on the water.

It is recommended participants in the event, and mariners in general, follow guidance from the CDC and local government health authorities to prevent the spread of coronavirus, *including social distancing and the use of face coverings when social distance cannot be maintained.*






This a quick screen shot of District 3's Spring Award Meeting on May 29 2020 This meeting had 35 participants from various D3 squadrons.

Safety Article

Social Distancing can be Fun!

This summer, boaters will be facing many "can't", "don't" and "not allowed" both on the land and on the water. Social Distancing may be with us for a while, but boaters will always find a way to enjoy the pleasures of the water within the limits



of the law. So, today's boaters are thinking how about *Canoeing* or *Kayaking?* These are enjoyable water sports that are not only fun but can provide you with a great cardio workout.

In fact, Long Island's lakes, rivers and streams are ideal for this type of sport. But, like all water sports, boaters will need to plan their voyages and adventures in advance. Here are few safety tips to make the experience more enjoyable.

Handling a Kayak or Canoe: As you know, kayaks have a narrower hull and less freeboard making them less stable than canoes. But on the other hand, kayaks can be easier to maneuver in the water. The trick to handling a kayak and a canoe safely is to keep them balanced at all times. Remember to take extra care when getting in and out of a canoe or kayak. It is most important to maintain that 'three points of contact' we talked about in the ABC3 class. When you sit, don't lean to the right or left. Keep erect and always distribute your weight equally.

Attempting to stand or move about in a canoe or kayak, too quickly, can greatly increases the chance of capsizing. By keeping your shoulders inside the boat's gunwales you can avoid capsizing. Be careful when reaching for an item in the water...don't lean over the gunwale causing the vessel to tip.

Hazards to think about: Canoeists and kayakers have a few things working against them. They tend to boat in remote areas, far from rescue resources or help from passersby. In addition, these boaters enjoy paddling in waters alone or with only one other person. Since these vessel are prone to capsizing caused by unstable conditions, this could be a serious problem if rescue is required. Furthermore, canoeists and kayakers are risk for *entrapment*. This dangerous situation occurs when a boater becomes snagged on rocks or debris and the boater is held under the water due to severe hydraulics water movement. Regardless of what kind of personal floatation device the boater wears, a trapped paddler could easily drown. Be aware of low-head dams as they pose serious dangers above and below the dam. If separated from your boat in swift current, float with your feet up and pointed downstream to protect your head and lessen the danger of entrapment.

In more populated areas, kayaks and canoes, may not be seen by other larger boaters. Or, they may capsize from large boat wakes. Stay close to shore or large stationary objects. Make yourself visible by using bright colors on your kayak, paddles and clothing. Consider the use of reflective tape on your kayak and paddles.



Equipment check: At a minimum, wear adequate clothing and pack a spare change of clothes in a zip lock bag, as well as, a small first-aid kit, cell phones, handheld VHF marine radio, GPS, lights, etc. Have a compass for navigating, a chart to help you know exactly where you are, and a whistle to attract attention. It's a small boat but there are small spaces that you can use for storage. Consider carrying a spare paddle. You can stow a take-apart model easily below the deck of your kayak or in the bow of you canoe.

Always wear a life jacket, Know how to Rescue yourself and Practice how to assist another boater, Know the local Regulations and Navigation Rules, Understand the elements of hazards—wind, current and terrain and by all means take the **USPS Paddle Course**.


