Member's Article - Baby it's Cold Outside

With winter fully upon us, most of us have already completed our winter storage procedures. After all, it's January! In fact, cold weather is a great time for me to look through my computer library of **saved articles and ideas** I've collected. Consequently, I came across an interesting list entitled "**Things we should do but think we don't have time - list!"** I complied this list from several articles from 2010-2011 collection of boating magazines. Perhaps, you would call it a "**2nd Winter Check List?**" These tasks can all be accomplished even if you boat is already

shrink-wrapped. So, just because it's cold outside, you still have some boater tasks that might save you some money and help make next year's launch even more enjoyable - come spring.

Top Off the Fuel Tank

If you didn't get a chance to top off your fuel tanks, there are several new companies out there who will deliver gas and/or deiseal fuel your boat. Of course, you must check with your marina or boat storage facility to ensure that fuel delivery is permitted. Honestly, you can't beat the



personal fuel delivery idea. There's no stress, just a checkbook or credit card. Furthermore, during the top-off procedure, consider adding a **good quality** fuel stabilizer. Run the engine for 10 minutes to pull the new fuel and the stabilizer into the system. For outboard motors, Mercury Marine suggests that you disconnect the fuel line and start the engine. Then run the carburetor dry. As the engine breathes its last bit of fuel, give it a good dose of engine fogging oil to help prevent corrosion.

Don't forget to flush!

You've heard that since you were a kid. Did you ever think it would be part of your boat maintenance? There is a product out there called Salt-Away (and others like it), which has been around for some time. It's used to flush inboards, outboards, I/O's, and personal watercraft motors. Plus, it can be used as an exterior salt removing treatment. Salt-Away is water-based, non-hazardous, biodegradable, and contains properties that attack and remove salt from any surface. The manufacturer claims that it is safe for use on any metal, aluminum, fiberglass, paint, rubber, plastic, chrome, glass, or surfaces exposed to salt. However, research any *new product* you use and sample it in a small area to see how it works.

Baby, it's Cold Outside! Put on an extra blanket. Boats on the hard (which means stored on land) get chilly, too. Think about how that breeze blowing off the water against the hull can decrease the inside temperature of your boat. With no form of heat-producing devices available, you may want to capture as much heat as possible the natural way. Shrink-wrap can help you capture some heat. The cabin and bilge temperatures can build up under the wrap, and it can get pretty warm. However, in the evening, without the sun beating down on the wrap, the air temperature can cool down quickly, moisture can form, which could cause mold and mildew. Products like Damp-Rid and Star Brite Absorber will help here. Look around for sales, especially at this time of year. Place the moisture guards around the boat. Don't be cheap by a few extra. Furthermore, to help capture some of that daytime heat put a blanket or comforter on your engine. I know it sounds crazy, by it can help keep your engine a little warmer during the evening, and next spring, your engine may thank you for that comfy— cozy feeling.

Winter is a great times to take an <u>America's Boating Club's Engine Maintenance</u> course. The course was designed to help boaters with routine maintenance in the spring, summer, fall, and winter. Tips on changing your oil, maintaining fluids, and identifying potential problems are primary discussion topics. Classes will be Virtual but you'll feel like everyone is together, warm and toasty as your learning. Contact Tom to learn more about courses offered this winter.





Safety Article

Headlines: "3 Huntington houseboat victims overcome by fumes"

Remember this headline from 2010 – to be precise, on March 24th. It was followed by an article that stated: "Two men and a woman were pronounced dead at Huntington Hospital after they were found unconscious on a 38 foot houseboat in Huntington Harbor. The houseboat was located about 200 feet offshore in the harbor, amid dozens of moored vessels...an area which is popular with...pleasure boaters. The victims were apparently overcome by noxious fumes. Suffolk Police reported that "There was a gasoline generator on the boat...suspect carbon monoxide poisoning..."

We all know from our boating class that Carbon Monoxide is a potentially deadly gas produced by the incomplete burning of any material containing carbon. Thus, carbon-based fuels (such as gasoline, propane, charcoal, or oil) need to be treated with care.



The primary sources that produce this deadly gas include **gasoline (boat) engines**, generators, cooking ranges, and space and water heaters. The colorless, odorless, and tasteless gas has caused a startling number of boating fatalities. The U.S. Coast Guard has reported 31 incidents of boat-related Carbon Monoxide poisoning, including 5 deaths in 2019 and 41 incidents with 5 deaths in 2020.

Clearly, boat owners need to educate (or re-educate) themselves about this 'silent killer.' It is often impossible to detect CO2 before it overcomes a victim, who is often too weak to respond. Note that most incidents occur on older boats, within the cabin and other enclosed areas, including under shrink-wrapping during winter storage.

Many boaters agree that winter is an ideal time to work on the boat. It's quiet and you can feel like you're on a desert island...just you and your boat. But if you use a heat source during these days of solitude, you may find yourself in jeopardy. It may be cold outside, but providing an opportunity for fresh air to circulate while you're working on the boat may have dual advantages: it will keep you safe from CO2 poisoning and help to keep your energy levels up. Also, take time to install a few battery-operated Marine-rated CO 2 detectors. They are reasonably priced and should be part of your personal safety equipment.

On page 13 there is a simple checklist recommended by the U.S. Coast Guard and USPS/America's Boating Club. Take a minute and print the list, laminate it, and put it on the boat. The idea here is to know and be mindful of this potential killer. Winter can still be a fun time for boaters, and remember:

Educated Boaters are Safer Boaters.

Continued from Safety Article: Here's Checklist that you should PRINT, Laminate and keep on board.

Befo	re Cruising or Working on the Boat: Make sure you know where CO exhaust outlets are located on your vessel.
	Test the operation of each CO alarm by pressing the test button.
	Everyone should be educated about CO poisoning while on board.
	When docked, or rafted with another boat, be aware of exhaust emissions from the other boat. ****Never run your generator while you're sleeping***
	Confirm that water flows from the exhaust outlet when the engines and generator are started.
	Listen for any change in exhaust sound, which could indicate an exhaust component failure.
Once	e a Month
	Make sure all exhaust clamps are in place and secure.
	Look for exhaust leaking from exhaust system components. Signs include rust and/or black streaking, water leaks, or corroded or cracked fittings.
	Inspect rubber exhaust hoses for burned, cracked, or deteriorated sections. All rubber hoses should be pliable and free of kinks.
Once	e a Year (Have a qualified marine technician)
	Replace exhaust hoses if cracking, charring, or deterioration is found.
	Ensure that your engines and generators are properly tuned, and well maintained.
	Inspect each water pump impeller and the water pump housing. Replace if worn. Make sure cooling systems are in working condition.
	Inspect all metallic exhaust components for cracking, rusting, leaking, or loosening. Make sure they check the cylinder head, exhaust manifold, water injection elbow, and the threaded adapter nipple between the manifold and the elbow.
	Clean, inspect, and confirm proper operation of the generator cooling water anti-siphon valve (if equipped)
